HOW CAN FEMINIST DEVELOPMENT POLICY SUPPORT WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS AND ACTIVISTS IN THE DIGITAL SPHERE?

6 March 2023, 2-3.30pm EST, German House, 871 United Nations Plaza, NY 10017

The digital transformation generates major opportunities to promote gender equality and women's empowerment by granting increased access to knowledge, income, employment, or support services. At the same time, digital tools have created new spaces for perpetuating and amplifying existing forms of discrimination and exploitation of women and girls in all their diversity. Feminist and women's rights activists continue to face harassment, surveillance, and censorship in the digital sphere, which in turn prevents them from fully taking advantage of ICTs.

On a national and multilateral level, several countries have announced to pursue a feminist development and foreign policy. Bringing together a wide range of experts from activist, civil society, and policy contexts, the envisioned event aims at bridging the gap between growing challenges in the digital sphere and feminist approaches to development policy. At its core, the event will create space to critically assess how a feminist development and foreign policy can support feminist and women's rights organizations or activists and their cause in the digital sphere.
