Q&A/Interventions from the floor

Background

As stated in the Report of the UN Secretary General on Women, Peace and Security (2022)¹, in the Sahel, women represent a minority among security and justice agents due to gender stereotypes and norms. This gender imbalance affects strategies, operations and the ability to respond to community needs, especially those of women and girls, who are the most affected by the protracted insecurity in the Sahel.

As a response, Sahel member states as well as regional organizations such as the G5 Sahel and civil society organizations have developed innovative and culturally tailored approaches to increase the number of women in security and justice sectors at all levels (political, strategic, and operational), with the support of United Nations Office for Drugs and Crime, UN Women, and other UN entities contributing to the United Nations Integrated Strategy for the Sahel (UNISS). These initiatives are based on participatory processes - bringing together communities across age, gender, ethnicities - with the aim of deconstructing gender stereotypes and positively influencing perceptions towards women's vocations in security and justice, thus generating sustainable social and behavioral change.

Sahelian innovations to mainstream gender and empower women include creative tools such as edutainment campaigns (educational entertainment) that leverage new technologies and regionally owned initiatives to promote Gender Champions (women, men and institutions). Civil society organizations - notably youth and women associations - have played a key role in bringing structural gender-sensitive reforms in justice and security professional education.

These Sahelian innovations contribute to the implementation of UN Security Council resolutions 1325 and 2242, as well as the Sustainable Development Goals 5 (Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls), 16 (Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development) and 17 (Partnerships for the goals).
